

Rear Admiral John Ashby Baldwin, Jr., USN
President, Naval War College

Rear Admiral John A. Baldwin, Jr., a native of Baltimore, Maryland, was graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland and commissioned as Ensign, U.S. Navy in June 1955.

Rear Admiral Baldwin has served at sea in both the Atlantic and Pacific Fleets in USS DENNIS J. BUCKLEY (DDR-808), USS GAINARD (DD-706), USS JEFFERSON COUNTY (LST-845), and USS JOHNSTON (DD-821). His first command was USS MARYSVILLE (EPCER-857). He subsequently commanded USS JOHN R. PERRY (DE-1034), commissioned USS MEYERKORD (DE-1058) as her first Commanding Officer, and commanded Destroyer Squadron THIRTY-THREE and Cruiser-Destroyer Group THREE. While in command of Cruiser-Destroyer Group THREE, RADM Baldwin also commanded the KITTY HAWK Battle Group during a deployment to the Western Pacific and Indian Oceans. He is currently serving as President of the Naval War College.

Rear Admiral Baldwin has served ashore with the U.S. Naval Small Craft Facility at the Naval Academy; at the University of Washington, Seattle, Washington for postgraduate education in Oceanography; on the staff of the Oceanographer of the Navy; as the senior advisor to the Vietnamese Navy in Military Region II; as part of, and subsequently head of the Sea Control Forces Group in the Systems Analysts Division of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations; as Deputy Director of the Office of Program Appraisal in the Office of the Secretary of the Navy; as Executive Assistant to the Secretary of the Navy; as Military Assistant to the Deputy Secretary of Defense; as the Director of the Systems Analysis Division in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations; and as Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Plans on the staff of the Commander in Chief U.S. Pacific Fleet.

Rear Admiral Baldwin's decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit with Gold Star, the Bronze Star with Combat "V," the Meritorious Service Medal, and the Vietnamese Honor Medal First Class.



Vice Admiral David E. Jeremiah, USN

Vice Admiral David E. Jeremiah, a native of Portland, Oregon, graduated from the University of Oregon in 1955 and received his commission through Officer Candidate School in 1956.

Vice Admiral Jeremiah served at sea in both the Pacific and Atlantic Fleets in USS CHARLES E. BRANNON (DE 446), USS EDMONDS (DE 406), USS MCGINTY (DE 365), USS TWINING (DD 540), and USS BENJAMIN STODDERT (DDG 22). He served as Executive Officer of USS JOSEPH STRAUSS (DDG 16), and in 1974 took command of USS PREBLE (DDG 46). Vice Admiral Jeremiah commanded Destroyer Squadron 24 and subsequently served as Commander, Cruiser-Destroyer Group EIGHT. As CTF-60 in the Mediterranean he directed the capture of the Egyptian airliner carrying the hijackers of Italian cruise ship ACHILLE LAURO. As Battle Force Commander during freedom of navigation operations in the Gulf of Sidra between January and March 1986, he directed actions resulting in the sinking of two Libyan warships and destruction of an anti-air missile site.

Vice Admiral Jeremiah has served ashore as Assistant Head and then as Head, Surface Electronic Warfare Section in the Command, Control and EW Division of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations; in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Program Analysis and Evaluation; as Head, Program Plans and Development Branch within the General Planning and Programming Division of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations; as Executive Assistant to the Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet; and as Executive Assistant to the Chief of Naval Operations. On 27 June 1986, he assumed his present duties as Director, Navy Program Planning (OP-090).

Vice Admiral Jeremiah has a Master of Science degree in Financial Management from George Washington University. He has attended the Armed Forces Staff College and the Harvard Business School.

Vice Admiral Jeremiah's awards include the Distinguished Service Medal with gold star, Legion of Merit with gold star, Meritorious Service Medal with gold star, Navy Achievement Medal with Combat 'V', Navy Unit Commendation with bronze star, Meritorious Unit Commendation with bronze star, Navy Expeditionary Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Sea Service Deployment Ribbon with silver star, Vietnam Service Medal with one silver star and two bronze stars, Republic of Vietnam Meritorious Unit Commendation (Gallantry Cross Color) with palm, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal with device, and Korean Order of National Security Merit (Samil) Medal.

Vice Admiral Jeremiah is married to the former Connie Jo Beem of University City.

UNITED STATES NAVAL WAR COLLEGE COAT OF ARMS

The wavy white and blue bars at the bottom of the shield represent water. The trident rising from it symbolizes mastery of naval activities. The three tines of the trident allude to an understanding of naval warfare at sea, in the air, and on land. The pilot wheel alludes to the mission of the Naval War College, education in naval warfare. The eight spokes refer to honor, duty, leadership, command, strategy, tactics, logistics, and weapons. The laurel wreath is for achievement of the mission. The motto is "Victory Through Sea Power."
