

History of the U.S. Naval War College

Founded in Newport, Rhode Island on October 6, 1884, the Naval War College is the oldest war college in the nation, and the first military service institution in the world to be designated a war college. Commodore Stephen B. Luce was the first president and organized the War College as "a place of original research on all questions relating to war and the statesmanship connected with war, or the prevention of war." These foundations were built upon by Captain Alfred Thayer Mahan, second president of the college, who had originally been selected by Luce to initiate the course in Naval History. Of all the men who were to influence the institution in its early years, none was to have such a profound impact. Mahan's views profoundly affected such leaders as Henry Cabot Lodge and Theodore Roosevelt and through them and others helped shape the United States' destiny at the turn of the century. Mahan's writings published as *The Influence of Seapower Upon History, 1660-1783* gained him worldwide acclaim and established the Naval War College as an internationally respected institution.

Functioning continuously since 1884, except for brief periods during the Spanish-American War and World War I, the War College numbers among its graduates such distinguished naval officers as Admirals Sims, Spruance, King, Nimitz, and Halsey, in addition to many others who today are holding prominent military positions.

The work begun more than one hundred years ago by Luce and Mahan continues today. As graduates well know, the curriculum is both demanding and rewarding. For the military professional, the education provided by the Naval War College is unrivaled.

THE ACADEMIC PROCESSION AND REGALIA

For centuries, institutions of higher learning have dignified their ceremonies with an academic procession, a custom descending from the clerical procession. The procession is led by a marshal, followed by the student body and the academicians or faculty, each attired in the robes prescribed for his degree. Distinguished visitors and delegates follow the faculty, and last in the procession comes the president of the institution.

Each member of an academic procession ordinarily wears a cap, gown, and hood. In the procession today military faculty will not wear academic gowns. The earliest illustration of gowns worn at Oxford University somewhat resembles cassocks worn by English teachers who found good use for the hood, or cowl, as protection against the weather. A uniform American system of academic heraldry displays the level of the degree, the field of study in which it was earned, and the institution by which it was granted.

It is the hood which provides academic regalia its color and offers the most information about its wearer. The silk lining of the hood bears the color, or colors, of the degree-granting college or university; its velvet facing reveals the color assigned to each area of study. Bachelor's gowns are relatively simple, falling in straight lines from an elaborate yoke and having pointed sleeves. Masters gowns are slightly more elaborate and fasten about the wrist. The Doctor's gown is marked by velvet panels down the front and around the neck, as well as by three bars of the same material on the well-shaped sleeves. It is cut more fully and may be ornamented. The hood worn is three feet in length for Bachelors, three and one-half feet for Masters, and four feet for Doctorates with velvet trimming of two, three, and five inches in width respectively.

The edging, or facing, velvet of academic hoods indicates the area of study. The principal scholarly fields seen in the procession today include:

The American mortarboard, derived from the soft Oxford cap, is black. Its tassel, for holders of the bachelor's and master's degree, is usually black, while gold tassels are worn by holders of doctoral degrees and heads of institutions. The tassel is worn on the right side of the cap by undergraduates, on the left by holders of bachelor's and higher degrees.

Admiral James L. Holloway III, U.S. Navy (Retired)

Admiral James L. Holloway III retired in 1978 as the twentieth Chief of Naval Operations after thirty-nine years of active service in the U.S. Navy, during which he served in combat in three wars. His naval career encompassed a broad experience in command of major fleet units during combat operations, and an extensive background in Navy program planning and management. He was the first nuclear power trained officer to rise to the Navy's top uniformed position. His duty assignments include destroyers in the Pacific during World War II, a jet fighter pilot in the Korean War, commanding officer of the nuclear aircraft carrier U.S.S. *Enterprise* during combat operations in Vietnam, Commander Sixth Fleet Striking Force during the Jordan crisis of 1970, Commander of the U.S. Seventh Fleet during the Vietnam War, duty as Vice Chief of Naval Operations, and most recently, assignment to the post of Chief of Naval Operations and a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Admiral Holloway currently serves as President of the Council of American-Flag Ship Operators (CASO), a national association representing a majority of the owners and operators of U.S. flag liner vessels engaged in the foreign commerce of the United States, with headquarters in Washington, D.C.

After leaving the Navy, and prior to assuming his position with CASO, Admiral Holloway served on the Defense Science Board, Chaired the Special Operations Review Group which investigated the aborted Iranian hostage rescue attempt, and has been a consultant on Defense matters to Paine Webber Mitchell Hutchins, Inc. Among his other activities, he is President of the Association of Naval Aviation, President of the Naval Historical Foundation, Chairman of the Academic Advisory Board of the U.S. Naval Academy, a member of the Advisory Committee to the Board of Trustees of the Citadel, a Trustee of St. James School, a Director of the Olmsted Foundation, and a member of the Board of Historic Annapolis, Inc.

He was recently appointed as Executive Director of the Vice President's Task Force on Combatting Terrorism, and named as a member of the President's Blue Ribbon Commission on Defense Management.

His decorations include two awards of the Defense Distinguished Service Medals, four Navy Distinguished Service Medals, two Legion of Merit Awards, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star Medal with Combat V, the French Legion of Honor, the Grand Cross of Germany, Grand Cross of Italy and the Order of the Rising Sun of Japan.



**Rear Admiral Ronald Frank Marryott, USN
(President, Naval War College)**

Ronald F. Marryott, of Prospect Park, Pennsylvania, became the 42nd President of the Naval War College on August 8, 1985. He was designated a naval aviator in 1959 after graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland in 1957.

His initial operational tours were with Patrol Squadrons FIVE and FORTY-SIX including deployments to the North Atlantic, Mediterranean and Pacific. He was also assigned as the Project Mercury Recovery Officer for the first 3 manned space flights.

In 1964, he was a faculty member at the Naval Academy where he taught courses in Naval History, History of U.S. Foreign Policy, U.S. Government and Politics and International Relations. He reported to the Staff of the Chief of Naval Operations in Washington, D.C., as the Special Support Plans Officer in the Strategy, Plans and Policy Division in 1969.

He became the Executive Officer and subsequently Commanding Officer of Patrol Squadron NINE in 1972. Immediately following his first command tour, he served briefly as the Special Assistant to the Commanding Officer of Moffett Field (California) Naval Air Station before returning to Washington in 1974.

He was assigned as the Primary Security Assistance and Sales Officer for the Far East Region, Bureau of Politico-Military Affairs in the Department of State. In 1976, he became the Executive Secretary to the Chief of Naval Operations for Joint Chiefs of Staff matters (OP-06C).

In September 1979, he assumed command of the Moffett Field, Naval Air Station. After selection for Rear Admiral in February, he reported as Commander, Iceland Defense Force in August 1981.

Subsequent flag assignments in Washington include duty in July 1983, as the Director, Strategy, Plans and Policy Division (OP-60) on the Staff of the Chief of Naval Operations and an assignment as the Assistant Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Plans, Policy and Operations (OP-06B) in June 1984.

His formal education includes a Master's Degree from The American University in Washington; a year at the Wyoming Seminary in Kingston, Pennsylvania; and a baccalaureate degree from the Naval Academy. He is also a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Virginia and the National War College in Washington.

Rear Admiral Marryott is married to the former Carol Ann Westendorf of Elmhurst, New York. They have three sons, Ronald Jr., Robert and Thomas.
